What is TDB?

Trips Database Bureau (TDB) is an Australasian non-profit industry organisation whose purpose is to improve transport planning practice through better data, research and developing best practice through a co-operative and collaborative model.

TDB provides a central database of trip and parking related information, research and advice for central/regional/local government, consultants and other transport professionals' organisations. It undertakes research of travel and trips by all modes to all land uses.

Membership is made up of, and open to, organisations involved in transportation planning and design including professional groups, individuals, local and regional authorities, government transportation agencies and reciprocal membership is offered to university engineering/ planning departments and sibling groups internationally.

Key Presenters

Steve Abley – Steve is a Chartered Professional Engineer and the Managing Director of Abley Transportation Consultants. He is a Fellow of the IPENZ and one of the authors of the national guidance regarding Integrated Transport Assessments and Trips and Parking Related to Land Use Revised.

Malcolm Douglass – Malcolm founded the TDB in 2002 having had an illustrious career in land use and transport planning throughout New Zealand. He is a Fellow of both the NZPI and IPENZ and a life member of the Transportation Group. He is 'nearly retired' and in 2011 moved from Christchurch to Nelson.

He is currently National Transport Planning Manager in the Highways and Network Operations division of NZTA in Wellington. Ian is a Director of Flow Transportation Specialists and has extensive experience in undertaking transport assessments and for developing trip forecasts for a wide range of developments.

His project focuses on measuring the transport energy footprint of urban forms and understanding opportunities for increasing the resilience of residents to fuel price rises.
